Best Practices for Indigenous Guest Speakers in Classroom Lessons

Native American Student Services is happy to help you make connections with guest speakers, knowledge keepers and elders. Speakers are an excellent way to showcase contemporary Indigenous experts and leaders, to provide new perspectives, and to increase student engagement. Please follow these practices when inviting Indigenous speakers to the classroom:

Plan ahead. Following these guidelines to find the best possible speaker requires forethought and intention. Consider coming to an IEFA Work Session with your team to work with an IEFA coach on a speaking request.

Before reaching out to a speaker, ask yourself, "Is there already a resource available that fits this need?" There are thousands of resources already available on a wide range of Indigenous content and issues, including videos, field guides, apps, handbooks, virtual field trips, books, lessons and units. Many local content experts and Knowledge Keepers have digital presentations available as well. Consider coming to an IEFA Work Session to view available resources.

Use speakers to provide content expertise. Please do not contact speakers with general requests about identity, being indigenous, customs, etc. as this can come across as generalizing of all Indigenous identities and can feel tokenizing to the people you ask. Please only make requests to fulfill special content knowledge or areas of expertise.

Be individually and tribally specific. Please do not ask presenters to speak on behalf of all Indigenous peoples or tribes. Please center your request on the knowledge, experience or perspective the guest speaker can provide that is specific to them and/or their tribal affiliations.

Provide compensation. Speakers are taking time out of their work or family schedule to accommodate your request. Please offer compensation (\$50/hour, including planning time) and to cover travel expenses by providing a gas gift card. Reach out to your school PTA for financial assistance. Native American Student Services is not able to help with compensation.

You must make the request. We are happy to connect you to speakers, but the request to speak, including dates, times, content and compensation must come from you.

If you make a request via email, follow up with a phone call. Many of our knowledge keepers live in areas with limited internet and cell phone service. It may take repeat emails and calls to get a hold of someone.

Stay engaged. If a speaker is present in your classroom, please stay engaged during the lesson, take notes, and help with basic classroom management.
