Course Description

You will engage in a study of the U.S. government and the ideals, practices, policies and structures that characterize our constitutional republic. Students will gain factual knowledge, but more importantly, they will develop the skills of careful reading, critical thinking, effective written and oral communication, and self-advocacy. Students will leave this class prepared to exercise their political rights and responsibilities in an informed, effective manner.

Expectations

This will be a great class! We will learn about why our country is the way it is. There will be multiple opportunities to tailor this class to each class's/individual's interests. That said, in order to keep this class fun and functional I ask you to think critically about these expectations:

- Be here everyday. If you are excused absent, you will need to make up the work on your own.
- Be on time. It demonstrates your respect (or lack thereof) for me and your classmates.
- Phones: See school policy.
- Be engaged. I PROMISE everything is more interesting if you actually pay attention. You'll know what's happening, you'll hear cool things, you'll learn better.
- Snacks. Bring them! We'll talk about this further in class.... But I need snacks, you need snacks, history needs snacks. If we're responsible, we're good.

Acknowledgement of General Election Year

Engaging in these discussions will not only enhance their understanding of the electoral process but also prepare them to make informed decisions when they (possibly!) vote this November. Your involvement is crucial in fostering a sense of civic responsibility and encouraging active participation in our democracy.

Late Policy/Absence Expectations

Plagiarism

The Sentinel High School student handbook defines cheating as, "An effort to improve grades by copying notes, papers, looking at another's paper or test, plagiarism, etc." In this context plagiarism includes representing someone else's work as your own through methods including, but not limited to, copying a classmate's work, copying from an online source/author (including generative AI), quoting a source without citing a reference, and inserting a couple of your own words into another author's statement without citing the source. Plagiarism/cheating in this class will result in a **zero** on the assignment, with the possibility of parent contact, ISS/OSS, a replacement assignment, etc., as stated in the "consequences" section of the student handbook.
